
## How to include race in your preaching

#### Internal Questions



"First, I must confess that over the past few years I have been gravely disappointed with the white moderate.

I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion that the Negro's great stumbling block in his stride toward freedom is not the White Citizen's Counciler or the Ku Klux Klanner, but the white moderate,

who is more devoted to "order" than to justice;

who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice;

who constantly says: "I agree with you in the goal you seek, but I cannot agree with your methods of direct action";

who paternalistically believes he can set the timetable for another man's freedom;

who lives by a mythical concept of time and who constantly advises the Negro to wait for a "more convenient season."

- Dissonance: bias, normative, culturally acceptable, ingroup preferences, white supremacy







#### Gratitude

- What lesson of good news or redemption can the text provide the listener?

#### Pablo Jimenez

- 1. by looking for the places of marginalization in the biblical text as an entry point;
- 2. by seeking points of contact between one's community and the text;
- 3. by making a correlation of social locations between the characters in the story and members of one's community; and
- 4. by finding a key metaphor to help communicate the liberating gospel to the listeners.

- How can you learn them?
- When can you use examples from other ethnicities and cultures as sermon illustrations?
- How can your stories provide additional illumination of the text?



- What is the honest history of your church?
- Who do you reach out to and why?



- I must stand with, not above nor beneath.
- I must offer compassion because such were some of you
- I must recognize the divine intervention that allowed me to learn about racism
- I must speak with grace and patience
- I must offer good news, knowing that I'm merely a tool in the Master's hand

#### What should we say?

• The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me. He has sent me to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the prisoners and recovery of sight to the blind, to liberate the oppressed. (Luke 4:18)
